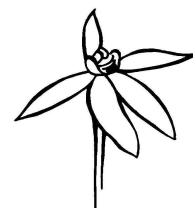

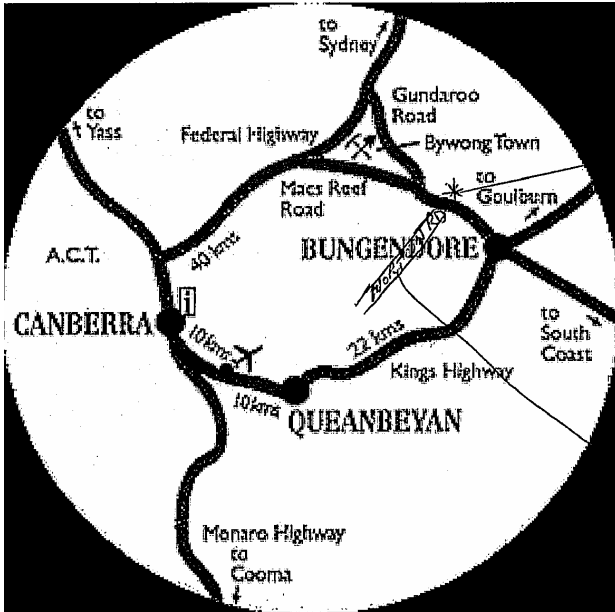

November General Meeting 2005

The night's guest speaker was Trevor Hughes, a south coast Cymbidium grower, to speak once again on growing Cymbidiums and also to take another look at how members have grown their Cymbidium 'Margaret Thatcher' orchids donated by Trevor a few years ago. Trevor grows his orchids from the flask stage through to 7-inch pots when they are sold. He sells at this size as this gives a large flowering plant that is still easy to carry from the nursery. Double pots make for easier handling as well as having the advantage of keeping roots cool over the summer and warm in the winter. He recommends sticking with the potting mix that works for you, rather than trying every new fad. The recommended **potting mix** is a good quality 'Cymbidium Mix' such as is available from the Orchid Society. Plenty of **water** in the growing season is the recommendation for Cymbidiums and the specific mix is close enough with enough fines to maintain a good level of moisture after watering. It is recommended not to let the orchids dry out completely over summer, but keep dryish in winter, especially in Canberra. **Potting** is done with 3 basic pieces of equipment. A ¼ piece of fence paling, snippy scissors and a sharp knife. And a sterilizer. The fence paling is used to bop off the pot from the roots and is very effective! From this point it is possible to cut off the bottom 1/3 of the roots. Then cut vertically away from growths making divisions of 3 bulbs – an old bulb, last year's bulb and the new shoot. The aim is to get the new shoot growing as large as possible, so it is therefore desirable to have more roots than leaves. For this reason older leafless back bulbs are discarded, as they tend not to have any viable roots. Of the 3 bulbs being used for

division, the oldest bulb has all of the leaves removed, and the leaves on the last year's bulb may or may not be reduced. This loss of leaves would happen naturally, but by removing them manually the process is speeded up and growth can happen sooner. When placing in the pot the roots, if bulky, may be twisted and forced into the pot, as damaged roots will still work – keep the amount of roots greater than the leaves. Place the new growth in the center of the pot. Mix can be brought up about halfway over the bulbs and the level is an inch or so down into the pot so the plant has room to grow. The roots will quickly fill this and push out the top. Then place to grow in the usual situation. Remove any emerging flowers. Trevor grows his Cymbidiums in good bright light (50% shadecloth) with smaller plants in heavier shade. It is important to remember not to divide and repot too often, as large specimen plants are ultimately the desired outcome. **Pests** are dealt with using 'Eco Oil'. Trevor uses 'Eco Oil' at full strength with no problem of clogged pores. This was apparently a problem with the mineral oils. Because the action of the oil is to smother pests, no resistance can be built up. It is therefore possible to control mites when using the oil regularly for scale and other insects. **Fungal problems** are dealt with using 'Eco Carb'. This product is basically Potassium Bicarbonate and works by creating an alkaline surface on the leaves. According to Trevor fungal problems are stopped in their tracks with spores killed and further infection prevented. Trevor uses the 'Eco' products once a month, though application intervals are specified on the product. Soft rots are more difficult to deal with and can be a problem with lush growth. Coastal conditions mean that rain falls of an evening in the growing season, which is favorable for the soft rots. In commercial situations losses are expected and the only measures that combat the problem are to maintain good vigorous growth with good air circulation and light. At the end of the talk we looked at the Cymbidium 'Margaret Thatcher's that people had been growing. There were fewer than Trevor had originally brought to us to try, as many had died in the early stages when quite small. This was because, as Trevor pointed out, it is difficult to raise a small plant from the flask size. It is always easier to continue to grow a mature plant. Of the Cymbidiums looked at, the need for more water and feeding was generally clear. Cymbidiums do well with plenty of both. Another point made was that when there were many new growths, while it was tempting to keep them, it was necessary to remove most of them so that energy could be put into the few remaining and produce larger bulbs. The larger the bulb, the larger the flower spike would be. The advantage of growing down the coast was also pointed out due to a longer growing season. Despite this, we had an excellent example of a 'Margaret Thatcher' grown by Ron Boyd that matched Trevor's plants.

Journal Reviews October 2005

Orchids (AOS) September 2005

Articles include (a) a special report on the addition of Diatomite (a siliceous rock) to orchid potting mixes in various proportions. Diatomite is inert, does not decompose, absorbs large amounts of water, and provides good capillary action within the mix. Tests in various mixes confirmed that those with higher diatomite content provided higher water retention and promoted earlier flowering. Further tests are planned using pure diatomite. (b) the importance of a good Newsletter to a successful Society (c) hybridization trends in *Vandas*, including some wonderful photos of some recent hybrids (d) standards being set in the hybridization of large-flowered *Cattleyas*, again with some great photos (e) a description of *Dichaea hystricina* and *Dichaea cilioata*, found in Costa Rica, along with cultivation requirements. (f) distinguishing between *Trichoglottis rosea* and *Trichoglottis latisejala*, two often confused species native to the Philippines, and (g) suggestions for keeping a Society's membership growing and enthusiastic.

Orchids (AOS) October 2005

Articles include (a) growing *Cypripediums* in the garden (b) the history, taxonomy and cultivation of *Kegeliella kupperi*, an epiphyte related to *Stanhopea*, *Gongora* and *Paphinia* found in Costa Rica, Panama and Colombia. (c) the importance of buying plants with correct names, with particular reference to the ease with which one can now purchase unnamed *Phalaenopsis* in supermarkets and garden centres – includes numerous photos – named of course! (d) a report on a visit to the El Pahuna Orchid Reserve in Ecuador, with a list of the orchids which can be found there, and photos of some really beautiful ones. (e) variations in *Masdevallia floribunda*, a Mexican and Central American orchid (f) a description, with photos, of orchids which may be found in the Montreal Botanical Garden (g) an analysis of moisture dynamics in orchid pots and media in an effort to answer the much-asked question “How often should I water my orchids?”

Journal Reviews November 2005

Orchids Australia October 2005

Les Nesbitt writes on the cultivation of Australian terrestrial orchids. Colin Hamilton writes on methods for reducing and conserving water in the cultivation of orchids. There is an article based on a presentation by Gary Yong Gee on the recent re-naming of orchids. Alan Englert writes about an unusual *Dendrobium kingianum* found on the north coast of NSW, which appears to be a mutation, with some oddities about the labellum and petals. Peter Taylor writes about *Maxillaria sandariana*, which he regards as the “King” of the species. There is an article which describes how to check the registration and nomenclature of orchids on the web, using www.rhs.org.uk/seedlist/registration_orchids.asp. An article by Marilyn Light emphasizes the necessity for exercising extreme care when looking for orchids in a natural environment, noting that even one person moving carefully through the forest has an impact.

(d) Another article continues the series on *Oncidinae* hybridizing – this time covering *Odontoglossum* and its Intergeneric hybrids. (again great photos) (e) *Sarcochilus* hybridization, and future directions, and (f) Directions in hybridizing modern pendulous *Cymbidium*s.

Articles include (a) and analysis of albino forms of *Paphiopedilums*, *Cypripediums* and *Phragmipediums*. (b) The influence of colour forms of *Vanda* species in hybridizing. (c) albinistic forms of *Odontoglossums*. (d) The importance of molecular breeding in plant improvement, particular as to flower colours. (e) Understanding floral pigments in the formulation of colour in *Disas*. (f) Colour variation in *Dendrobium kingianum* and (g) two articles on insect vision of colours in flowers
