Not many people realize that while the club has bought some of these plants, many are donated by members. For example, the February door prize was donated by Brian and Lynne Phelan. Rob Rough and Theo and Jenny Schutz have all donated many plants over the years. We are very grateful for these helpful donations and hope that those that win the plants appreciate them and have

good success with them. We encourage any of you that have potted cuttings from your plants to donate them for the raffles. The only stipulation is that the donated plants should be reasonably established (a rule of thumb is about 1 year in the pot) so that less experienced growers will have success and they won't fall out of their pots.

On the subject of the popular vote, I would like to encourage all members and guests to participate. The rules are very simple and require no great expertise. Vote for flowering plant in each category that **you** like best, it is that simple. Do not forget to vote for the best orchid of the night.

I would urge that any member who knows of someone whom they think might be an interesting speaker to make the suggestion to a member of the committee. There are still a few places left for this workshop. This year the Eurobodalla Orchid Club is hosting the annual two day workshop. It will be held on Saturday and Sunday March 17th and 18th 2007 at the Luhuna Motel, Princess Highway, Moruya. The format involves lectures and demonstrations of many aspects of orchid culture from these two experts. There will be plenty of time to ask questions or to talk privately to the speakers. The cost is \$50 for the weekend which entitles you to morning and afternoon teas and a BBO lunch on both days, except no afternoon tea on Sunday. Dinner on Saturday night will be at a local restaurant at the participant's own expense. It is a fun time to meet members from other clubs and to share information.

. What is a "Novice" Grower?

A number of people have asked what is the definition of a novice grower and what does it mean.

Monthly meetings: A novice grower is one who has never won a popular vote in any category of orchids at a monthly meeting. The Committee has decided to reintroduce a special part of the bench allotted to novice growers to encourage people who have had their first blooms to bring them in. This will be a separate category which will be judged on its own. Growers must identify themselves as novice and either tell the bench organiser (Rob Rough) or place their plant (any type of orchid) in the area identified for novices. Once a novice has won a popular vote, they are no longer a novice and in future their plants will be judged with the others.

The yearly show: Novice growers can be entered in displays (Section A) or as individual plants (Section C). "Section C is open only to financial members of the Orchid Society of Canberra, residing within 50 km of the ACT. In Section C, 'Novice' shall mean any exhibitor until they have won in an aggregate of first prizes in any 3 sub-sections at any Orchid Show or Shows, but they shall cease to be a novice in respect to each sub-section in which they win a first prize. The exhibitor shall remain a novice until the end of the calendar year in which they win their third first prize, but shall cease to be a novice in respect of a particular sub section in which they have won their first prize.

In all cases, the bench organizer or show marshal(s) must be aware that a submitted orchid is from a novice grower.

An immediate response was given from Brian and Lynne Phelan, so a 'thanks' to them. The plan is for someone different to volunteer each meeting to do the counting and thereby share the load.

Guest Speaker:

Tonight Mark Clements gave us a talk and a look at some of his 3,500 photos taken on a recent trip to Madagascar, off the coast of Africa. Mark and his partner Anne travelled to Madagascar along with 7 others, all of them involved in some way with the orchid industry. The pictures taken in Madagascar were amazing with every picture bigger and better than the last. Since the French left the infrastructure has fallen into disrepair, and this

made travelling tricky at times. Mark had photos of 'highways' that were pot-holed tracks and bridges that had fallen down and just been left. Then there were the stories of zebras on air strips and overloaded utes that served as taxis. Apart from this there was the task of organising the teams of porters, guides, cooks and permits to get into the tops of the mountains. Anyway, we saw pictures of orchids growing right on the beaches and also in every other imaginable place (I didn't get all the names but many were angraecoid orchids), amazing chameleons, beautiful gentle lemurs, huge leafed begonias, really pretty fluffy mealy bugs, huge baobabs, big green slater-like millipedes, giant snails, 'dead leaf' frogs, geckos, hibiscus, kalanchoes and lots lots more. 80% of the income for the island comes from the vanilla bean, and the flowers are hand pollinated each day. The pods are sorted by size and stacked in shelves. One shelf pictured was worth a huge amount of money. We saw pictures of very Asian looking rice paddies and this according to Mark is probably related to the fact that the people of Madagascar are originally from Indonesia. There was also a trip to the Tsingy, an awesomely huge limestone formation that goes for miles and has been weathered into sharp deep fissures that make it impossible to walk across. It was a great talk and we loved seeing the orchids from the very wet areas to the very dry, and we really loved seeing all the creatures, especially the lemurs! Thanks Mark.


