Disclaimer

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The Show is different this year

- It will be held at the Wesley Centre, 20 National Circuit, Forrest
- Plant entries will come from the clubs in the South and West region
- Clubs will present their orchids in displays, as well as on the bench
- There will be no displays by individuals
- Plants can be delivered to the Wesley Centre from 10:00 am on Friday 4 October and we ask that Canberra members deliver their plants no later than 11:30 am. Plants brought later (but registered before 4pm at the latest) may have to be benched rather than being included in the society display.
- Setup of society displays will begin at 10 am on Friday 4 October and must be complete by 5 pm.
- Judging will commence at 6 pm on the Friday 4 October
- The show will be open 9am-5pm on Saturday 5 October and 12noon-4pm Sunday 6 October.
- There will only be stickers for the plant identification and, if applicable, seedling and novice.
- The schedule classes and order have been changed.

Registration instructions for Canberra members

Members of other orchid societies will generally have their entries co-ordinated by their society. The following is for Canberra Society members.

Plant pre-registration

Members are asked to follow essentially the same procedures as in previous years - that is, fill in a registration form of the plants you intend entering and where possible, lodge it with the registrar by 6pm on TUESDAY 1 October if submitted electronically. It is easier to register all possible plants and delete some on the day than add plants to your list.

If you receive the Bulletin by email

Approximately two weeks before the show you will receive an email regarding registration. Use either the attached Excel spread sheet (preferred) or Word document for recording your entries. Email your completed form to orchids@canberraorchids.org by 6pm Tuesday 1 October, or contact Peter Coyne if you would like to email your registration later than this. If you do not have Word or Excel, simply email a listing of your entries, one per line, of the class, name and whether a seedling (in the case of plants) separated by a comma without spaces, e.g. 4,Cymbidium suave 'Dorrigo', N. An entry form is also on our website www.canberraorchids.org.

If you receive the Bulletin by mail

If you can submit your entry form electronically, please follow the procedure in the preceding paragraph. A registration form and schedule is included with this bulletin. If you cannot submit your entry electronically, please use this form to compile a list of plants/items you intend to enter and phone Peter Coyne (6251 7660) by 6 pm on Tuesday 1 October to advise him of your expected entries. Bring your form with your plants to the venue for checking purposes. A printed form of your entries with relevant codes and stickers will then be ready on your presentation for registration.

Unable to Pre-register?

If you are unable to pre-register as requested above, please bring in your plants as early as possible on the Friday.

What Class is my plant?

If you are uncertain as to what class to enter a plant, please contact Mark Fraser - phone: 6287 1106 or email triffids4us@ozemail.com.au. An information paper on what plants are in each category is also on the website.

Delivery of plants to the venue

Because we need to construct the Society's display before 5pm on Friday, we ask that people bring plants in to the Wesley Centre before 11:30am. We understand that some people will not be able to do that, so either:

1. Arrange for someone else to bring your plants to the hall (preferred), or
2. Bring your plants (and your registration form) to the meeting on Wednesday evening before the show. The registrar will give you your stickers there to put on the plants. Make sure that you have labelled each of your plants with your name (either with a sticker on the pot or on a tag) and put your name on your box(es) or trays. It is your responsibility to pack the boxes firmly so the plants are stable. Someone will then take your plants home and deliver them to the hall on Friday morning.

Registration

At registration you will be given:

- A printed list of your entries complete with identification codes for the plants
- A white sticker with an identification code for each entry
- An orange sticker for seedling plants, and
- A pink sticker for each novice entry.

Attach the stickers to your entries as per the printed entry list. Note that there is no sticker identifying owner and class so it is suggested you put a sticker with your name or some other form of identification on the bottom of the pot (or somewhere out of sight on the entry). Making sure that the white sticker is clearly visible when the plant is in its preferred viewing position. Strike out on your entry form any plant not presented, sign and return the sheet to Peter Coyne.

Consult the Show Schedule for further information on conditions of entry.

Orchids owned for less than 6 months

If you recently purchased an orchid that is not eligible for judging you can still display it in an area reserved for plants that have been owned for less than six months.

Sale of art entries

Entries in the Art, Craft and Photography Sections may be sold but these may not be removed from the Show until 4:30 pm on Sunday. Prices should include the Society's 10% commission.

Sale of plants

Plants for the sales table can be brought in to the Wesley Centre from about 11am – we just need a little time to set the tables up before you arrive. Remember to put a price tag in each pot with your name and the price. The Society will charge a 10% commission on sales. Ensure that your plants are pest and disease free and well-established in their pots.

Entry to the show

All Canberra members will be admitted to the show without charge while they are wearing their society name badges. We will be doing a badge order immediately after the September meeting so if you have lost your name badge, please tell Jane Wright or Bill Ferris to order you another. At the show, it would be helpful to the public if you wore your society polo shirt. We will have shirts for sale at the September and October meetings.

Open CSIRO Glasshouses

Volunteers from the Society have been helping to grow these plants for the past 5 years. Please meet at the car park behind the Centre for Plant Biodiversity (aka the Herbarium building) at CSIRO Black Mountain at 1:30 pm to be signed in for the tour. To find the herbarium:

From Clunies Ross Street in Acton (along from the Australian National Botanic Gardens), turn northwest at the roundabout onto Julius Road and the CSIRO site. Drive past the guardhouse, then at the roundabout, take the second exit which leads you up the hill. At the top of the hill, follow the road that curves to the right. The Herbarium is then on your right. Take the first right onto Greenhouse Lane, drive past the entrance to the building and take the first right to go behind the building. You have now reached the car park (congratulations!). Please note that this is a members-only event.

General Meeting Minutes
3 July 2013

Members Present: 34, Apologies: 9
Visitors: 4

Speaker: Gary Hart presented a highly motivating talk on Paphiopedilums.

Paphiopedilum spp. have a wide range of environmental needs so you need to decide what cultural approach suits you and then choose plants which will grow in those conditions. Gary grows his plants within a temperature range of 2 – 40°C. He has a large glasshouse and a large bush-house, both with 70% shade cloth and no heating.

Gary's preferred potting medium is New Zealand pine bark, because it doesn't need to be soaked before use, nor does it need added dolomite or fertiliser. With the bark, he mixes some large perlite and charcoal. For fertiliser, Gary uses 'Peters Cal-Mag Grower' and 'Peters Blossom Fertiliser', which are best applied at one-quarter strength. Water Paphiopedilums sparingly to avoid root-rot and also provide them with good air circulation.

Gary re-pots every two or three years even if the plants look happy as they are. Re-potting can stimulate growth and flowering. When re-potting Paphiopedilums, make sure the pot is the right size for the root ball rather than the spread of the leaves. The pot should just comfortably accommodate the roots even if the leaves spread much

wider. If the plant has virtually no roots when re-potting, a pipe-cleaner can be used to make substitute 'roots' to hold the plant securely in the potting mix.

To display the flowers, tip the pot forward with the bud facing to the front and support the back on something rigid. Do this when the flower spike is small so that when the flower is open and the pot is set flat, the stem and flower are more upright. Also, Gary suggests holding the petals back gently with pipe-cleaners so the flower is nicely open for display. When staking flower spikes, make sure to fasten them below the ovary (no higher).

The genus Paphiopedilum has 50 to 60 species that are divided into six main groups, with each of the groups having somewhat different cultural requirements. In addition, there are numerous primary hybrids (often between groups) and many non-primary hybrids. The groups include:

- Maudiae - These have mottled leaves and prefer to be grown in low light. They grow fast and can flower within 18 to 24 months of de-flasking. Remove the bottom leaves, as roots emerge above them. Potting mix should be kept moist, not dry.
- Multi-floral - These are slow-growing when young and might take ten years to flower. With heating they may flower earlier. Divide sparingly. Grow high in the glasshouse with bright light.
- Classical - Plants available now are the result of 160 years of breeding. Although they produce large flowers, their popularity has declined in recent years, in favour of other groups. They grow and flower well in temperatures down to 5°C. Water evenly during the flowering cycle.
- Parvicephalum and Brachycephalum - These have mottled leaves and low light requirement. They prefer temperatures above 15°C and respond badly to re-potting or disturbance. Pot them close to the edge of the pot, not in the centre, as they grow better that way. They need a dry period in winter, having originated in a climate with distinct wet and dry seasons. Make sure there is no water left in the crowns of the plants overnight, as they may rot and die.
- Albino forms - are harder to grow.

Judging of Paphiopedilums is mainly on flower shape and colour (two-thirds of the points), then size, number of flowers, habit, arrangement and condition.

Suitable companion plants for Paphiopedilums include *Phragmipedium*, *Coelogyne*, *Maxillaria*, *Lycaste* and Pleurothallids.

Phragmipediums have two basic types - hard-leaved and soft-leaved. Hard-leaved plants grow happily down to 3°C, but soft-leaved plants need temperatures above 15°C.

President's Report:

Jane reminded members of the approaching Regional Show and Conference and the need for members to assist, as the number of people attending will be large.

Q & A: Jane pointed out that winter can be rather difficult for orchid growers because of the need to reduce watering so plants aren't left wet overnight. However, if fans are running to keep the air moving, the plants can then dry out. Thermostats were discussed at some length. Thermostats that turn heating on if the temperature becomes too cool and also turn coolers on if it is too hot are available cheaply if ordered from China on the internet. Bought locally they cost about \$50 but Jane recently bought two from China for \$10.

Growing competition:

Seedling *Phalaenopsis* plants were distributed to members last November for a growing competition and this month we had the first progress review. Gary Hart assessed those plants which had been brought in and selected two for special mention. One had a flower spike, which was already well developed. Jane had re-potted this plant into bark twice since November due to its vigorous growth. In contrast, Peter Coyne's plant had grown substantially, but was still in the original small pot with sphagnum. This plant had been growing on a north-facing kitchen window sill, though protected from direct sunlight, misted opportunistically, and fed by spraying nutrient solution fairly frequently.

General Meeting Minutes

7 August 2013

Members Present: 34, Apologies: 6
Visitors: 2

Speaker: Jan Robinson gave a highly entertaining talk on a trip to the tip of Cape York.

Although the trip was not planned as an orchid expedition and she had not undertaken any prior research, Jan found orchids in great abundance. Also in plentiful supply were the appalling roads and dubious creek crossings, making her consider \$110 for the ferry to cross the Jardine River to be money well spent. If the roads were dreadful, the food sounded little better, be it their own canned and dried food or meals bought at roadhouses and hotels.

Cape Tribulation was the first stop where Jan found epiphytic orchids (*Bulbophyllum bayleyi*) on trees near their camp. At Cooktown she saw *Dendrobium discolor* with huge canes. She also saw this species at Weipa, Punsand Bay and Thursday Island, where she saw a huge plant in a garden which she was told had been flowering continuously for forty years. At Punsand Bay she also saw *Dendrobium canaliculatum* and *D. johannis*. In places, roadside trees were densely draped with orchids. The fishing in the Gulf of Carpentaria was not very rewarding, judging from Jan's photo of her husband proudly holding up his catch – a fish less than three centimetres long. On the way back, near Atherton there were lots of orchids in gardens and in the bush. *Dockrillia* plants were growing on trees along main roads in Cairns.

Unfortunately for orchid-spotting enthusiasts, most of the orchids in Cape York flower during the wet season when wet roads and flooded crossings prevent access. In the dry season the roads are trafficable (if only just), but the orchids are not in bloom (apart from *Dendrobium discolor* and *D. bigibbum* at a roadhouse).

Acceptance of Secretary's and Treasurer's reports moved by Ben Walcott, seconded by Nita Wheeler - approved

President's Report:

Jane reminded members of the approaching Regional Show and Conference, and that the October meeting will be about getting things ready for the show.

Q & A:

- Don't use organic fertiliser with sphagnum moss and apply only very little of any fertiliser.
- If growing Cymbidiums inside, they need a lot of light and good air movement and, to stimulate flowering, a nightly temperature drop. Now is an appropriate time to report those Cymbidiums which are not flowering, as well as Pleurothallids.
- New Zealand bark was discussed at some length. Kiwi Bark and Orchiata Bark are available and very good. Both are hard and flaky. Brian Phelan has been using it with perlite and a little chopped sphagnum and his plants have been doing very well. He uses it without any preparatory treatment. He said even if it cost \$100 a bag he would still get it because his plants are growing so much better (and the plants are worth a lot more than \$100). Orchiata Bark is available from The Orchid Tray Company and Bishops in Nowra. Kiwi Bark is available from Orchidaceous Books.

Next meeting: Gary Yong Gee from Brisbane (a fabulous photographer of native orchids *in situ*) will talk on miniature orchids with hints on photography.
